





Seismic Shift

Not far from the San Andreas fault, 15,000 Java enthusiasts and hundreds of corporate sponsors gathered for the JavaOne conference, Sun's worldwide forum for Java developers.

While Sun executives (including Bill Joy, the company's visionary chief scientist) delivered the majority of the keynotes, Pekka Ala-Pietilä, President of Nokia Corporation, William Coleman, Founder, Chairman, and CEO of BEA Systems and Larry Ellison, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Oracle also spoke at the San Francisco confab.

These high-profile presenters are a testament to the importance of Java.

We believe that the support for Java and advances in the standards, particularly Java 2 Enterprise Edition (J2EE) place the enterprise software industry on the brink of important changes. The final J2EE 1.3 specification, which includes internal support for XML along with several other new features, is expected to be available in the third quarter of this year although beta versions are already being used. J2EE lifts Java standards to meet the requirements of commercial business applications. Indeed, early movers such as MatrixOne already have a robust J2EE-compliant application and more are hopping on board every day.

We believe that J2EE is becoming the "right" architecture that customers will want their commercial applications to support. Customers will appreciate the benefits of having a common architecture across various applications and, unlike previous generations such as client server or proprietary architectures, the standards-based J2EE promises a high level of compatibility.

We also believe the J2EE movement will have another interesting impact on the industry. Because J2EE is a standards-based, object-oriented development environment, the integration of applications for different vendors is much simpler than it was even with C++. We believe that this may well fuel merger and acquisition activity as companies realize that the integration issues that acquisitions once raised should diminish if both parties have adopted J2EE. Indeed, Manugistics said Talus' J2EE architecture would speed its product integration. Since integration costs are factored into the price of an acquisition, we expect companies with a J2EE architecture to be valued at a premium.

Retail Investors Support Communications Equipment as Sector Slides

For the week ending June 1, communications equipment stocks made a comeback among retail investors even while the sector and broader market took a dive. The Nasdaq closed down 4.5% for the week ending. During the same week, Morgan Stanley Dean Witter's communications equipment analyst Alkesh Shah, who was bullish on the sector during last year's stock slide, now says **Nortel** (NYSE: NT, \$ 12.53) and **JDS Uniphase** (Nasdaq: JDSU, \$ 16.05) are not worth buying at current prices. His public statement caused network shares to follow the Nasdaq's downward trend.

Surprisingly, while all but one of the top 10 stocks on our bought list experienced **double digit declines** in share prices, retail investors went in and supported them. **New Focus**² (Nasdaq: NUFO, \$ 7.99), who is in the middle of a class-action suit filed on behalf of purchasers of its common stock during the period between Oct. 24, 2000 and March 5, 2001, ended the week down 27.5%, while Epoch's partners' retail investors **added 10.2%** to their positions. New Focus purchasers charge that certain of its officers and directors violated securities laws by providing materially false and misleading information about the company's financial condition and growth potential.

Similarly, retail investors also **supported Commerce One** (Nasdaq: CMRC, \$ 6.17) and **Network Appliance** (Nasdaq: NTAP, \$ 18.71) by adding 4.1% and 3.3% respectively, to their positions; the stocks were down 18.8% and 26.8%, respectively. Commerce One shares were down even though the company announced the completion of its acquisition of Exterprise, a leading provider of software solutions for building and managing collaborative business networks.

Retail investors were more diverse in their sales for the week. Investors unloaded a mix of software, communications equipment, and services stocks; many of these had a tough week. **Rhythms NetConnections** (OTCBB: RTHM, \$0.195) hit a 52-week low while **Priceline.com** (Nasdaq: PCLN, \$7.71) hit a 52-week high.

Visual Networks (Nasdaq: VNWK, \$7.67) announced it would cut costs by closing its New York City office and eliminating 40 jobs in conjunction with the closure.

Rhythms NetConnections' announced that its common stock would begin trading on the OTC Bulletin Board as a result of formal delisting by Nasdaq.

Priceline.com announced the addition of resorts to its "name your own price" travel offerings.
